## **Course Description & Learning Outcomes**

Senior Seminar is designed to help Biology and Marine Biology seniors incorporate the knowledge and skills they have obtained throughout their undergraduate studies. The goal of this course is to provide you with the skills necessary to research primary scientific literature and to effectively integrate and communicate research findings.

By the end of this seminar course, you will be able to:

- Effectively research the scientific literature.
- Distinguish between primary literature and review papers.
- Integrate the findings from various primary literature sources into a cohesive and thoughtful review.
- Deliver a professional presentation of your research topic, and address questions from the audience.
- Provide constructive criticism of a science talk.
- Write an effective CV, and understand the differences between it and a resume.
- Understand the importance of ethical conduct in research and professional settings.

#### Fact or Fiction?

Have you ever come across a biology-related claim and wondered whether there was any scientific evidence to support this claim? Scientific studies are often the topic of discussion in the news, social media, and even during family dinners. This semester, you will be conducting a literature review that examines the scientific validity of a biology-related headline or sound bite you have come across in the past.

#### The Microbiome

Microorganisms, which include prokaryotes and some eukaryotes[1], can be found in almost any habitat. Although invisible to the naked eye, these organisms greatly impact human, animal, plant, and environmental health. The microbiome, which is defined as the collection of microorganisms living in a habitat, makes important contributions to the system. Furthermore, changes to the microbiome have been associated with pathological conditions thus it is important to understand the relationships between microbiomes and their environments and the factors that can impact these relationships. In this senior seminar course, you also have the option of writing a literature review and delivering formal oral presentation on the microbiome of a given habitat (organ, organism (animal or plant), or ecosystem). In addition to describing the major species of the chosen microbiome, your review should also focus on the environmental factors that impact the microbiome and how changes to the microbiome can affect the host or be associated with disease.

[1] Although viruses are often considered microbes, these are not included in the description above because they are classified as noncellular entities; nevertheless, the effect of the microbiome on the susceptibility to viral infection and the potential effect of viruses on the microbiome of a system are suitable subtopics for discussion as long as these are within the scope of your review.

# Attendance & Participation

Given the nature of this course, attendance and participation are important. You will get the most out of Senior Seminar if you are actively engaged in class discussions. Doing this will help you in the process of writing your review and putting together your presentation. Attendance is mandatory and constitutes 10% of your grade. Two percentage points (2%) from your final grade will be deducted for the first unexcused absence, 3% for the second one, and 5% for the third. If you miss more than 3 classes, your grade will automatically be an F. You will only be excused for missing class if you have an emergency (please see the section titled "Emergencies" below).

On days during which you are discussing a paper with the rest of the class, your successful completion of the discussion will be counted as your attendance/participation grade for that day. This means that if you are asked, for example, to discuss a figure from one of your sources, and you show up to class, but do not participate, you will not receive any participation credit for attending class that day. If you turn in your slides for the class discussion, but fail to show up to class, this will be considered an unexcused absence.



#### **Seminar Attendance & Reflection**

Attend one biology departmental seminar, held on Mondays from 3:00-4:00 PM in WC-130, or another approved scientific talk (email me to request approval if you would like to attend a different seminar). Write a 1-2 page reflection (1.5 spaced) briefly discussing the science (i.e. main questions/results), and then focus on the speaker's presentation style, including what engaged you and what did not. Discuss traits or techniques you would like to emulate and what you would like to avoid. Reflections are due no later than one week after the seminar takes place, and must be submitted prior to the date of your formal presentation.

NOTE: Individual due dates for this assignment will be adjusted once you have selected the date of your presentation.

#### **Review Paper**

Below, you will find general information on each of the assignments associated with your review paper. Checklists/rubrics will be provided for each assignment under the "Assignments" link within the module for the week when the assignment is due.

#### **Tentative Title & Short Description (2%):**

- Provide a specific and concise tentative title for your review paper.
- Include a 150-250 word description of your topic (background information, the focus/aim of your review (see assignment link for a more detailed description)). Please note that in order to receive full credit you must adhere to the minimum word count requirement.
- Provide a reference formatted following American Psychology Association (APA), 6<sup>th</sup> edition style guidelines for a review paper that is related to your topic.
- Submit via discussion post (thread: Tentative Title and Short Description) by 11:59 PM of the due date.

#### **General Outline & List of 6 References (5%):**

- Please refer to the template provided (see assignment link).
- Submit 2 pages, double-spaced, not including references.
- Use 12 pt. font (Times New Roman or Garamond ONLY).
- Must include 6 references. Of the 6 references, at least 4 must be primary research papers, 2 can be a review papers.
  - The papers you select should not be older than 10 years.
- Format references according to APA guidelines (more information provided under "Final Review Paper" below).
- Submit by 11:59 PM on the due date.

#### First Draft & 10 References (4-6 pages) (10%):

Please refer to the description provided under "Final Review Paper" below for more information on what writing a review paper entails (we will also discuss this in class). Your first draft must meet the following criteria (please refer to the template provided):

- 4-6 pages, double-spaced, not including references
- 12 pt. font (Times New Roman or Garamond ONLY)
- · Must include in-text citations
- Must include the following sections:
  - Abstract (200-300 words)
  - Introduction (1-1.5 pages)
    - Must include your main statement (i.e. the purpose of this review is...)
  - First Section of the Body (1.5-3 pages)
  - Second Section of the Body (1.5-3 pages) (optional) (NOTE: This means that you can include this section if you
    have less than 4 pages between your Abstract, Introduction, and first section).
  - References

- Must include 10 references. Of the 10 references, at least 7 must be primary research papers, 3 can be review papers.
  - Include all the reference you plan to use in your final paper, even if you did not use all of them in this draft. In the reference list, highlight your 'unused' references in yellow (see template for clarification).
- The papers you select should not be older than 10 years.
- Format references and citations using APA guidelines (more information provided below).
- Submit by 11:59 PM on the due date.

#### Final Review Paper (10-12 pages) (25%):

A review of the literature on your chosen topic. Your paper should serve as a synthesis of what is currently known about your topic, and what is being investigated. Do not simply summarize each of your primary sources; rather, integrate the information presented, and come up with your own interpretation of the data. If the data on your topic is controversial (i.e. some articles support one view, while others take a different stance), you must address both arguments. Information on how to properly format your paper and references is provided below as well as in the Assignment link for the review paper. Papers will be graded by <u>rubric</u>. Please take time to review the <u>rubric</u> so that you are aware of the expectations for the review paper. In addition to this rubric, the <u>Southern Association for Colleges and Schools (SACS) rubric on Written Communications</u> (page 2) will also be completed for department accreditation purposes.

- Format your paper according to the template provided (see assignment link).
- Submit 10-12 pages, double-spaced, not including figures and references.
  - · NOTE: Figures are optional
- Use 12pt font (Times New Roman or Garamond ONLY).
- Must include in-text citations.
- Must include 10 references. Of the 10 references, at least 7 must be primary research papers, and up to 3 can be review papers.
  - The papers you select should not be older than 10 years.
- Include an appendix with the abstract from each paper used in your review (see assignment link for instructions).
- Submit by 11:59 PM on the due date.
- Format references and citations using APA guidelines.
  - Examples of formatted references are provided below but are also be provided in the template document for the paper (NOTE: The examples below do not have the correct indentation because custom indentation is not an option on Canvas). Please make sure you format your citations and references per APA, 6<sup>th</sup> guidelines to avoid having points deducted from your final paper. You will be taught how to use freely available citation managers to help you automate this process.

- For two authors, both last names are used: (Parkitny & Younger, 2017, p. 3).
- For 3 or more authors: (Pedersen et al., 2016, p. 558)

Yes, in text citations must include page numbers.

Please note that 5% will be deducted from your raw score (i.e. out of 100 points) for each day an assignment is late (See more information on late assignments below).

Papers and outlines will be checked for plagiarism through Turnitin integration via Canvas. Plagiarism will NOT be tolerated and will result in a failing grade for the course. Please refer to the Academic Honesty section below for more information on plagiarism.

#### **Extra Credit**

Take your review paper to <u>The Center For Excellence in Writing (https://writingcenter.fiu.edu/)</u> and email me a receipt of your visit (provided by the Center for Excellence in Writing) to receive **5% extra credit toward the grade of your final paper.** 

#### **Oral Presentation**

#### Mini Presentation (4%):

A 3-5 minute presentation of 4 slides from your presentation which present key concepts of your chosen topic. You are to present:

- · One Background Slide
- Your Question or Hypothesis slide OR a slide stating the purpose of your review
- Two data slides (NOTE: Do not title the slides "Data Slide"; write titles that are descriptive of the information shown on each slide). These slides **MUST contain a figure, graph, or table** from 2 of your primary sources and include a citation.
  - Figures and graphs are preferred over tables

#### Formal Presentation (25%):

- A 10-12 minute presentation of your research topic with a 3-5 minute Q&A.
- Your presentation must contain data from at least 3 of the primary sources you used for your review paper (figures and graphs are preferred over tables).
- The presentation must be uploaded to Canvas by the date you signed up to present (the calendar will be updated once presentation dates are selected). Additionally, please bring your presentation on a memory stick the day you are scheduled to present.
- PLEASE NOTE: Audio will be recorded for ALL presentations.
- Your presentation will be graded using the <u>Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) Rubric for Oral Communications</u> (please note that only the Oral Communications Rubric (page 3) will be used for evaluating the oral presentation).
- Professional attire is required for your presentation.

#### Participation (6%):

In addition to presenting you will also be required to ask at least 4 thoughtful questions throughout the course of the formal presentations.

#### **Curriculum Vitae (CV)**

A professional-looking, well organized 1-2 page CV. A Sample is provided within the module for the week and under the "Assignments" link. Please make sure to save this document as a pdf file to avoid loss of formatting.



The ETS Major Field Test in Biology is a nationally-scored exit exam for Biology and Marine Biology majors. It is a two-hour,

multiple choice (150 questions), online test graded by the Educational Testing Service that allows you to see how you rank nationally against your peers (this exam is a graduation requirement). For the purposes of this class, scoring is as follows:

1-29 percentile: 3pts≥ 30 percentile: 5pts

# Make-Ups & Late Assignments

The policies for Make-ups and late assignments are as follows:

- <u>Formal Presentation</u>: You will not be allowed to make-up your oral presentation unless you can provide official documentation (For example: doctor's note, court summons, police report) that your inability to be present was the result of an emergency (see what constitutes an emergency below). In light of this, please make sure you select your date to present carefully, as you will not be allowed to reschedule your presentation.
- Other assignments: Although late assignments will be accepted, 5% will be deducted from your raw score for each day your assignment is late. **Please note** that the maximum number of days an assignment may be submitted late will be indicated for each individual assignment; late assignments will not be accepted after the assignment closes.
- <u>ETS Major Field Test</u>: If you have a scheduling conflict for the ETS exam (i.e. you have another exam at the same time), you will be allowed to make-up the exam in a different senior seminar section. Please note that you will be asked to provide proof that your inability to take the exam at the schedule time is the result of a scheduling conflict related to the university's exam schedule.



#### **Emergencies**

Emergencies are unforeseeable and unavoidable events that preclude you from being able to attend class. Emergencies include:

- Serious illness/hospitalization
- · Car accident in which you were directly involved
- Death of an immediate family member

You will be required to provide documentation (e.g., doctor's note [Note: NOT an R.N.'s note], copy of death certificate, police report) in order to be excused and be able to make-up an exam or assignment. The documentation provided must be a valid and verifiable written letter signed by a professional or some other type of irrefutable proof.

#### Examples that do not constitute an emergency:

- · Having a cold or the flu
- · Getting stuck in traffic
- Oversleeping
- Scheduling a routine doctor's appointment (i.e. not related to an emergency) during class time

Although some of these are unfortunate circumstances, they are not emergencies and will not be treated as such.



In the case of extreme circumstances arising from reasons beyond your control (please, see description of emergencies above), an incomplete (IN) grade may be given at the instructor's discretion. Please Note:

- Official documentation will be required (NO EXCEPTIONS).
- IN grades will not be given prior to the drop date or after the course has ended.
- In order to receive an IN grade, you must have <u>completed at least half of the assigned course work and have a passing grade at the time the IN grade is requested.</u>
- An unfortunate event, such as the death of a family member, does not automatically guarantee that you will be granted an incomplete for the course. Each case will be carefully evaluated, and your overall performance will be taken into account when making a decision.
- If granted an incomplete, the course must be completed within two terms; otherwise, you will receive the grade you would have earned without being given credit for any incomplete assignments (this will likely be a failing grade).
